Introduction/ Workshop opening	Welcome the participants. The tutor informs the participants that in this workshop they will focus mainly on interactive digital magazines and audiobooks. These two types of learning resources are part of the Family Learning Toolkit of the WOWSA project. Activity 2: Practical tips for using the interactive digital magazines in family learning	The tutor presents practical recommendations concerning using interactive digital magazines in family learning of teenagers and young adults between the ages of 13 to 20.  Parents exchange practical experiences regarding increasing teenagers' digital literacy. The tutor will facilitate this discussion by asking some of the following questions:  In what digital skills are your children better than you?  In what digital skills are you better than your children?  Can you estimate how much time do your teenagers spend in the online world every day?  What works well for you in educating your teenagers?  What best practices would you recommend to other parents?  Which digital literacy topics are most useful for teenagers?  Which learning activities do your teenagers prefer? Activity 3: Utilising the WOWSA digital magazines in family learning	The tutor asks participants to find, without help, the WOWSA interactive digital magazines on the internet by using their computers or mobile phones. Their task is to look briefly at all 10 magazines and choose two magazines that they will use in their family learning. Activity 4: Audiobooks for senior adult learners and grandparents	The tutor plays two following audiobooks to the participants:  Disinformation, fake news and fact-checking Dangers of over-sharing online  Participants discuss them. Activity 5: Practical tips for using the audiobooks in family learning	The tutor presents practical recommendations concerning using the audiobooks in family learning of adult learners and grandparents.  Parents exchange practical experiences regarding increasing seniors' digital literacy. The tutor will facilitate this discussion by asking some of the following questions:  Do your parents use the internet?  Do your parents use a touchscreen smartphone connected to the Internet?  What digital skills do your parents have?  What digital skills do your parents lack?
